HHRTF Overview

- State took ownership in June 2022.
- Average census is 37 patients per day.
 - Efforts to continuously increase
- Waitlist average is 13 patients per day.
- Enhanced collaboration with Division for Children, Youth and Families and the Division for Behavioral Health.
- Patient & Family Satisfaction surveys demonstrate 90% of families are satisfied.
- Readmission rates remain extremely low at approximately 5% within 30 days.







Hampstead Hospital and Residential Treatment Facility KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Hampstead Hospital Transitioned to State of NH Ownership June 8, 2022.
- •Vendor assumed clinical operations under the oversight of onsite DHHS Leadership team.
- •New Mission, Vision, and Values identified and socialized.
- •HHRTF able to join in collaboration with the Integrated System of Care to improve identification of the appropriate level of care for children of NH in need of behavioral health services.

- Development of Human Infrastructure:
- •Onboarded Executive Leadership Team
- •Identified key positions needed to build the foundation of the organization to incrementally increase capacity and services.
- •Instituted a recruitment plan for the key identified positions. Significant gaines made

- Interagency development of first PRTF in New Hampshire:
- Program development completed
- Construction ongoing
- •Go Live scheduled for 2023

- 3 Locked Units
- Young adult unit with 15 beds
- Adolescent unit with 21 beds
- Child specialty unit with 16 beds (Formerly developmental delay unit)

Starting the Admission Process


- Child experiences an acute crisis (increase from baseline).
- Child is evaluated by mobile crisis or emergency department staff.
- Child must be evaluated to meet inpatient psychiatric treatment criteria.
- The evaluating team sends the crisis assessment to Hampstead Hospital admission department.
- Treatment team reviews for admission.

ACUTE CRISIS STABILIZATION



- Hampstead Hospital provides acute crisis stabilization.
- We support our patients in returning to baseline through medication adjustments and participating in therapeutic programming.
- Support patients and families with increasing after care supports.
- Coordinate with school districts to provide schoolwork and provide recommendations as needed.







Multidisciplinary Treatment Team

- Medication Provider (Psychiatrist, APRN)
- Social work
- Program Director
- Nursing
- Direct care staff

- On the specialty unit:
- Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA)
- Education Director (Unless child exceeds 14 days out of school)







Average Length of Stay

- Average length of stay is 7-12 days.
- This includes weekends when treatment team and providers are not in the hospital.
- Provide a fast-paced treatment environment due to length of stay.
- Provide stabilization services versus extensive therapy and behavioral management due to length of stay.
- Full benefit of medications may not be seen for four to six weeks.







Services offered at HHRTF

- Psychiatric treatment (rule out or confirm diagnosis, treatment planning, and pharmacological interventions).
- Trauma informed care groups (psychoeducation and coping skills learning for emotion regulation)
- Post-hospitalization planning (outpatient based care or residential facility coordination)
- Applied Behavioral Analysis (for behaviors displayed Hospital setting)







Services offered at HHRTF (Cont.)

- Multidisciplinary programming including creative art and physical activities
- Educational Services
- Coordination and planning with patients' schools for continuation of learning while hospitalized.

Residential Overview


- Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility (PRTF) to open 2023

Average Admission and Discharges










Average Monthly Census
