

# 2025 Granite State Health Care Coalition General Membership Virtual Meeting Executive Summary

November 5, 2025

The 2025 Granite State Health Care Coalition (GSHCC) General Membership Virtual Meeting was hosted virtually and provided over ninety partners from ambulatory surgical centers, assisted living facilities, association organizations, dialysis, emergency management, emergency medical services, home health care, hospice care, and palliative care, hospitals, long-term care, mental and behavioral health care, non-profit organizations, public health, regional partners, skilled nursing facilities, state government agencies, and urgent care with the opportunity to hear about past and upcoming GSHCC and New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Division of Public Health (DPH), Bureau of Emergency Preparedness, Response, and Recovery (EPRR) activities and participate in timely and relevant educational sessions on lessons learned from the American Cross response to the Lewiston, Maine shooting, lessons learned from the Granite Ledges evacuation, and best practices and forecasting in Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Healthcare.

## NH DHHS, DPH, Bureau of Emergency Preparedness, Response, and Recovery Update

Stephanie provided an update on EPRR activities including administrative preparedness, planning updates, and an overview of ESF-8 real-world response activities.

## **Red Cross Response to Mass Casualty Incidents**

John provided an overview of lessons learned and best practices from the American Red Cross Northern New England Region's response to the Lewiston, Maine shooting and subsequent manhunt in October 2023. John provided information on the American Red Cross response and processes for setting up a Family Assistance Center and Family Reunification Center. John noted there is a national movement to change the title of "Family Reunification Center" to "Family Notification Center," to reduce false hope of families seeking missing/impacted loved ones during mass casualty events. John spoke about implementing the Maine Resiliency Center and the extraordinary effort of many local, state, and federal agencies, non-profits and the private sector coming together to support the impacted community.

The panel spoke from the Granite Ledges facility, Concord Hospital, State NH DHHS, ESF-8, and GSHCC perspectives on challenges, lessons learned and best practices from the Granite Ledges long-term care facility evacuation in February, 2025. A fire caused the evacuation of the facility which led to uncertainty around evacuation processes for relocation and repatriation efforts among involved parties. Pre-established partnerships proved vital as the event led to minimal resident injury and zero deaths.
